Gilded statuette of (the Canaanite god) El, from Megiddo.

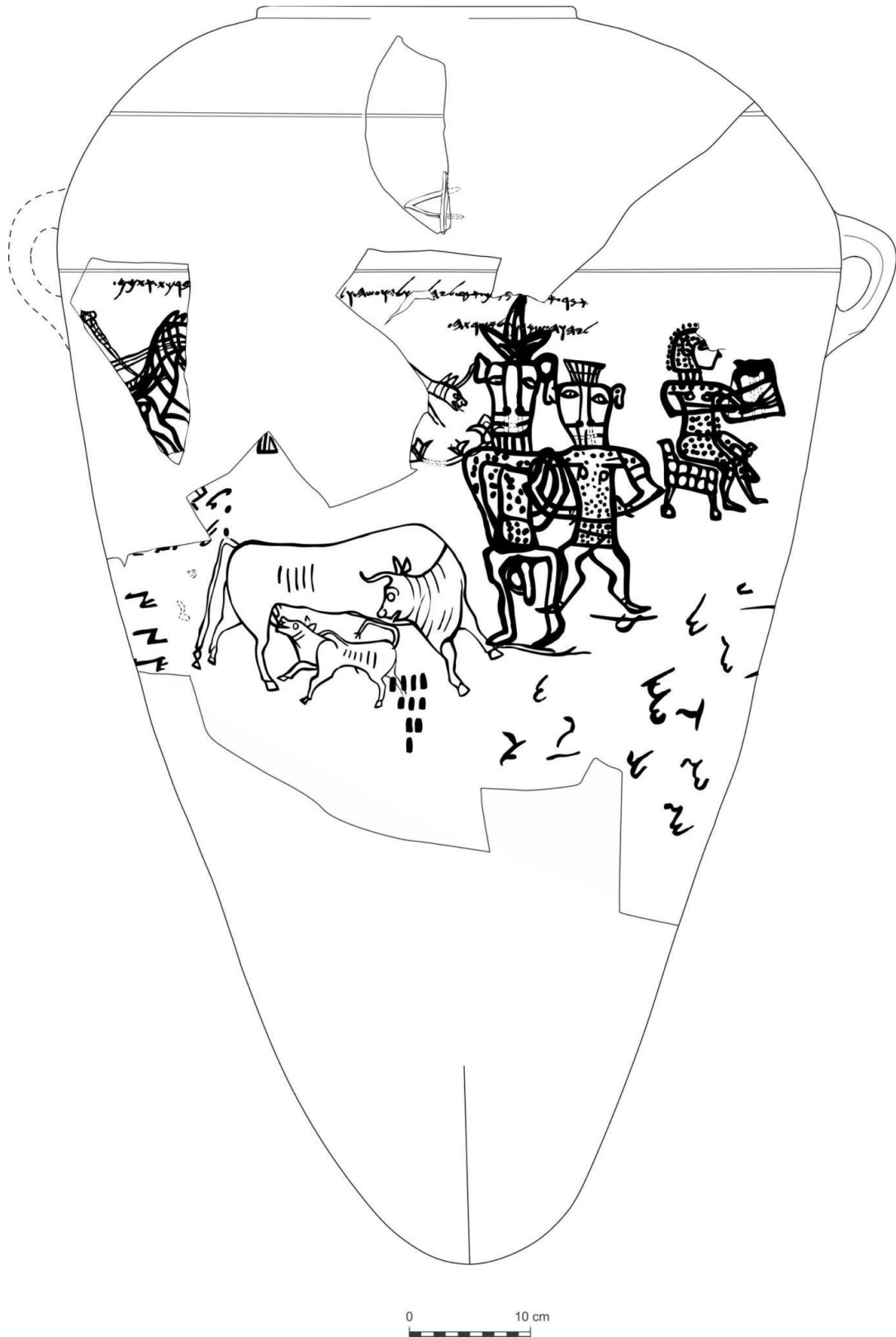


4th-century BCE silver coin from the Persian province of Yehud Medinata, possibly representing Yahweh enthroned on a winged wheel.

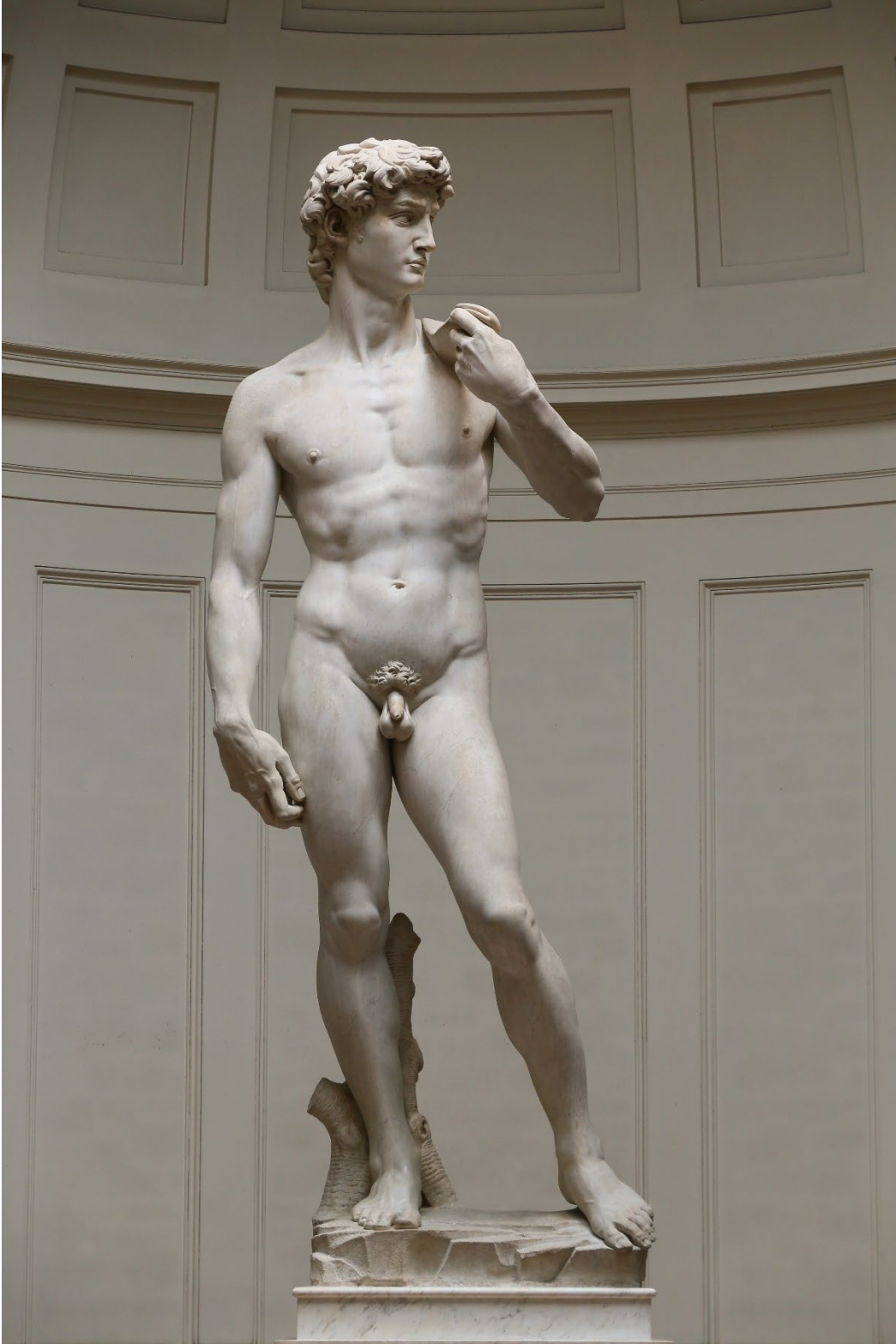

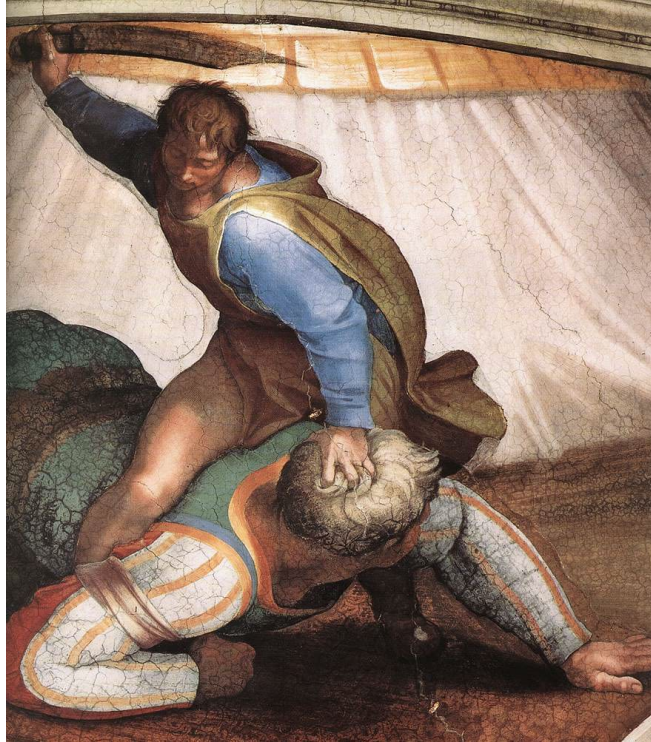

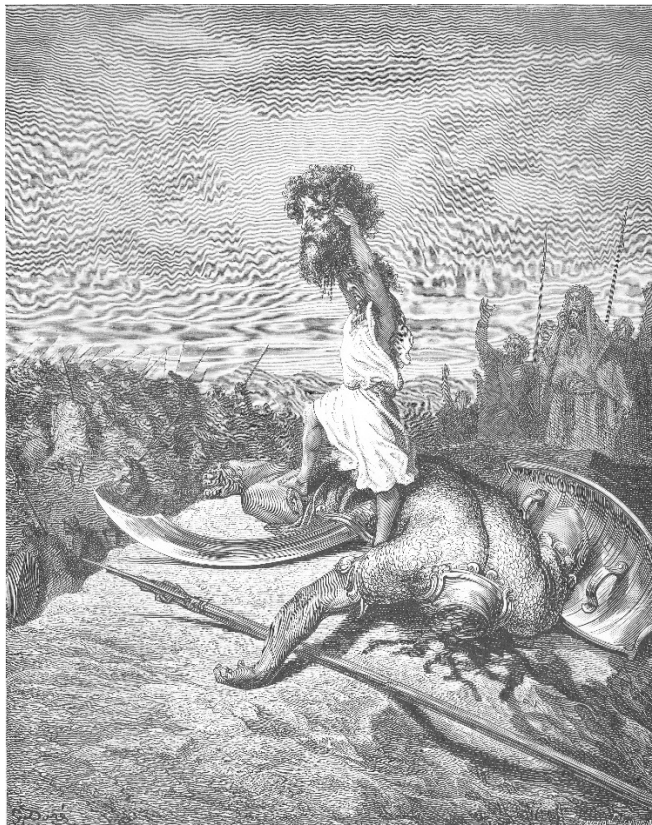
